Some researchers like Nadejda Marinchevska state that 1915 is the birth year of the Bulgarian animated cinema. The 80's were its strongest period. The 1984 film by Slav Bakalov <i>Marriage</i> won the Best animation award in Cannes. The production of animated films in Bulgaria in the 1980s has doubled since the 1970s. An apotheosis of its success is the nomination for Student Oscar for <i>The Canfilm</i> , created by Zlatin Radev. The last great success of an animator from the native animation school is Teo Ushev's achievement in the Oscar prize competition in 2017.

Czech animation has been a tradition for almost 100 years. It began in 1920s and its golden era dates between 1950s and 1980s. Czech animators include Jiří Trnka, Hermína Týrlová, Karel Zeman, Břetislav Pojar, Jan Švankmajer, Jiří Barta, Pavel Koutský, Aurel Klimt, Michaela Pavlátová, Mária Procházková or Martin Duda. Czech animators have employed cutout animation, puppet animation, 3D CGI animation and 2D animation as well. Two Czech short films <i>Happy End</i> (Jan Saska) and <i>Graffiti</i> (Libor Pixa) were shortlisted for Short Animated Film category of Oscars. Recent successes are the international distribution and awards (Chicago IFF) of the feature film <i>The Oddsockeaters</i> (Galina Miklínová), the Cinekid award and MIFA Annecy participation of the short film <i>Fruits of Clouds</i> (Kateřina Karhánková) or <i>Insect</i> , latest film by Jan Švankmajer.

Last Update 2019	In 1930s – the first attempts were made, but the animation industry started later. In 1957, Nukufilm (Puppetfilm) and in 1971 Joonisfilm (Drawingfilm) were established at Tallinnfilm Studio. Both studios were privatized after the SSSR collapsed and several smaller animation studios were also established. Some biggest names are Tuganov, Pars, Kütt, Heidmets, Unt, Jancis etc (in stop motion) and Raamat, Paistik, Pärn, Ernits, Tender, Lundgren etc (in cartoon animation). Comparing to neighbouring countries Estonian animation has been successful at the festivals, and it is still almost 100% financed by government (getting more than 1/5 of all the film industry budget). In last years, several feature animations have been released.

Last Update 2018	The 1980s would prove to be a peak of Hungarian animation. Increasingly bold use of irony and allegory portrayed the Hungarian condition under Communist rule and during this period a number of Hungarian films received high accolades and prestigious awards including Ferenc Rofusz' 1981 Oscar for <i>A Légy (The Fly)</i> . The decade would also mark a renaissance in technical experimentation with the exploration of many non-traditional graphic media such as plasticine, sand, coal, textiles, and computer animation. During this period the first feature-length films based on serials were created and proved to be quite popular. Today: 159 festival awards, 35 animation studios with permanent activities since the beginning of the Hungarian Media Patronage Program (2011), digital 2D and 3d and traditional animation as well.

Classical hand drawn animated films were predominant and there is at least one significant amateur animator with an outstanding film style. The Soviet era brought professional approach and education in Russian or Lithuanian film schools. The collapse of the USSR resulted in a cut of funding, negatively influencing classical animation.</p> <p>2014 is marked by second Lithuanian feature-length animated film <i>Golden Horse</i> dir. by V. Aškinis and R. Kalnaelis (LT, LU, DK). In 2015, Ilja Bereznickas received an award for lifetime achievements and contribution to the animation of Nordic and Baltic countries at the Fredrikstad Animation Festival in NO and animation and video games festival Beautiful Land of Nevermind (BLON) took place for the first time. In 2016 two short international co-productions premiered: 3D animation Junction (LT, CA, AU) and puppet stop-motion Downfall. Lithuanian animation is featured in many important international events and festivals, where it's as well represented by the Lithuanian Animation Association.</p>
